

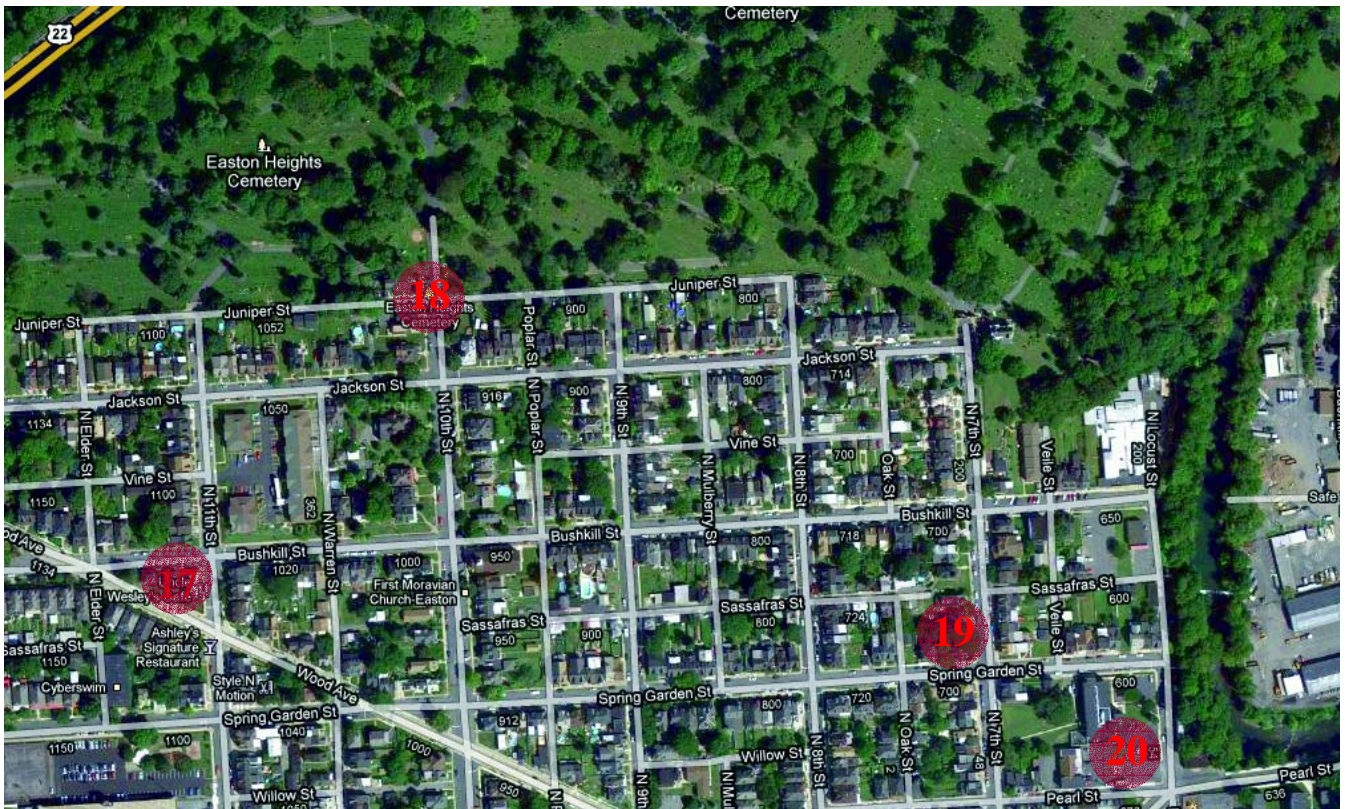


ROUTE II.

SEVENTH STREET: FROM EASTON CEMETERY TO THE NORTHAMPTON COUNTY COURTHOUSE

Cluster A: North Seventh Street

- Easton Cemetery is the burial site of George Taylor, an Easton resident who signed the Declaration of Independence
- The densely built West Ward has limited open areas; pocket parks created on former housing lots provide some of the few places for children to play
- The West Ward has a high concentration of public housing with underused open space
