Poetic Faith: An Imagined Seminar Christopher N. Phillips Advent, 2016

The purpose of this seminar is twofold: to guide me through an unwieldy, idiosyncratic bibliography in a compressed amount of time and to focus my reading and thinking on large topics I'm very interested in exploring during my sabbatical. Reading lists are subject to editing, and blogging will supplement note-taking as a way of processing and recording the learning I do over the coming weeks. By the end of the next three weeks, I will have plenty of food for thought while I continue my Frederick Burkhardt Fellowship at the American Antiquarian Society in Worcester, MA. I'm nearing the end(!) of my process in writing *The Hymnal Before the Notes* and starting the process for its followup, *Hymnic Reading*, and this seminar will feed my work on both of those projects.

Week 1: Books and Gifts

Central questions: How have books and their readers interacted in history, particularly at the intersections between media, devotional practices, and ideas about the book itself? And how might these ideas and practices interact with some of the most important scholarship from anthropology and philosophy about the meanings of gifts?
